SPAXTON NIGHTS

Hi, all. I had some lovely feedback to my last article. Mrs Higginbottom said *'It got me off to sleep faster than a bottle of scotch and 2 diazepam'* and so after the epic tome I wrote last month I promise I'll keep it a bit shorter this month.

So if we all go outside on the evening of the 10th April at about 8.00pm and look for the Crescent Moon, then keep going right you will come to a bright cluster of stars called the Pleiades. Below that and slightly to the right you should see a bright star in the twilight. That is in fact Little Mercury, the nearest planet to the sun.

On the same night at 9.00pm the Crescent Moon will be in the constellation of Taurus and will be passing through clusters of stars called the Hyades. Make yourself comfortable on a sun lounger, grab your binoculars and watch as the moon moves in front of 2 bright stars, the 1st one disappears at 9.02pm followed a few minutes later by the next one. It's a lovely sight to behold.

We'll soon be coming into the months when the night sky is lighter, so I'm going to take a break from my contributions to the SCN. If you do however have any burning astronomical questions in the meantime, please do not hesitate to contact me. If anything major does happen in the skies I will send a quick note about it through the magazine.
